

The Context and the Story

Pre-1973: Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM-II)

'personality disorders not otherwise specified'

'sexual deviations' (302)

'homosexuality' (302.0)

Post-1973:

- -homosexuality is not a mental illness
- -distress at same-sex attractions reflects homophobia
- -sexual orientation is stable



Evaluating Conversion Therapies

Do they pose a risk of harm?

- 1. positives
- 2. negatives

Do they effectively alter sexual orientation?

- -conversion therapies
 - -surgery, hormone injections
 - -behavior therapies: aversion therapy, covert sensitization
 - -reparative therapy (Nicolosi)

duration of change
physiological measures
retrospective & self-report measures

Evaluating Conversion Therapies

"...although sexual reorientation techniques have achieved moderately positive results, research is sorely needed on ways to improve the efficacy of the procedures. [They] do not yet operate at a level of sophistication and validity that will allow clinicians to place much faith in the procedures and use them in a competent manner, assured of the potential for success."

Sexual Orienteering: A Road Map



"Sexual orientation refers to an enduring pattern of emotional, romantic, and/or sexual attractions to men, women, or both sexes.

"Sexual orientation refers to a person's sense of identity based on those attractions, related behaviors, and membership in a community of others who share those attractions."

Sexual Orienteering

The "Kinsey Scale"

Rating	Description
0	Exclusively heterosexual
1	Predominantly heterosexual, only incidentally homosexual
2	Predominantly heterosexual, but more than incidentally homosexual
3	Equally heterosexual and homosexual.
4	Predominantly homosexual, but more than incidentally heterosexual
5	Predominantly homosexual, only incidentally heterosexual
6	Exclusively homosexual
X	Asexual, Non-Sexual

The Two Main Ethical Arguments

- 1. Conversion therapies are unethical because they:
 - -try to change the something that isn't a disorder...
 - -can't be changed anyway...
 - -and contribute to a hostile environment for people with same-sex desires

Solution: change, escape or reject community rather than internal desires

- 2. Conversion therapies are ethical because they:
 - -deal with a real disorder...
 - -that can be changed/healed...
 - -and people freely choose to seek such therapy

Solution: change, escape, or reject internal desires rather than community




