### GENERAL CONVENTION INFORMATION

REGISTRATION ARRANGEMENTS: All persons who attend the convention must register in the mail foyer (entrance) of the Bethel Seminary Administration Bldg. Someone will be there to handle registrations as delegates arrive. Registration fees will be collected, badges will be issued, collections made for rooms and meals and receipts issued.

ROOM ASSIGNMENTS: After registration delegates will be assigned their rooms and escorted or directed to the dormitory. Somenone will be there to help with baggage.

PARK FACILITIES: There are adequate parking facilities for all delegates both in the Administration Building area and by the Dormitory.

COFFEE BREAKS: This service will be provided by the Seminary for a nominal fee.
