

Annabelle Pratt received her bachelor's and master's degrees in electrical and electronic engineering from the University of Stellenbosch, South Africa, and her PhD degree in electrical engineering from Oregon State University. She is currently a principal engineer with the National Renewable Energy Laboratory. Prior to joining NREL, she was a senior power research engineer with Intel Labs, and previously, she was with Advanced Energy Industries where she developed power supplies for the semiconductor manufacturing and architectural glass coating industries. Her research interests include autonomous energy management of flexible loads in buildings to increase the penetration of renewable energy resources. She is a senior member of the Institute for Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) and active in providing peer reviews and in standards activities.

Named to *TIME* magazine's 100 Most Influential People in the World list for 2014, **Katharine Hayhoe** is an atmospheric scientist who studies climate change, one of the most pressing issues facing humanity today. But Katharine may be best known to many people because of how she's bridging the broad, deep gap between scientists and Christians. Together with her husband Andrew Farley, a professor of applied linguistics, pastor of Church without Religion, and best-selling author, Katharine wrote *A Climate for Change: Global Warming Facts for Faith-Based Decisions*, a book that untangles the complex science and tackles many long-held misconceptions about global warming. Her work as a climate change

evangelist has been featured on the Emmy award-winning documentary series "Years of Living Dangerously" and "The Secret Life of Scientists and Engineers." In 2012, she was named by *Christianity Today* as one of their "50 Women to Watch"; in 2014, she was awarded the American Geophysical Union's Climate Communication Prize, and named as one of *Foreign Policy*'s 100 Leading Global Thinkers and "20 Women Making Waves in the Climate Change Debate."

SUNDAY, July 30, 2017, 11:00 AM



Ian Hutchinson is Professor and former Head of the Department of Nuclear Science and Engineering, at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT). His group's experimental research, on confined plasmas hotter than the center of the sun, was a major contributor to the international effort to generate practical energy from fusion reactions, the power source of the stars. In addition to 200 journal articles and two science text books, he has also written and spoken widely on the relationship between science and Christianity. His book *Monopolizing Knowledge* explores how the error of scientism arose, and how it feeds today's culture wars and an excessive reliance on technology. Ian is a

fellow of the American Physical Society, the (UK) Institute of Physics, and the ASA.

MONDAY, July 31, 2017, 8:45 AM



Formerly holding the R. A. Hope Chair At McMaster University and serving as the president of the Canadian Scientific and Christian Affiliation, **James Peterson** (PhD Virginia) is now the Schumann Professor of Christian Ethics and Director of the Benne Center for Religion & Society at Roanoke College, the ethicist for Lewis Gale Hospital, and a professor at the Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine. At ASA he is a Fellow and the Editor-in-Chief of our peer-reviewed journal PSCF. He has been a clinical and research fellow in genetics funded by the National Institutes of Health, and published two books with Eerdmans on human genetic intervention: Genetic Turning Points and Changing Human Nature. Invitations to lecture have come from universities including Oxford, Queens, British Columbia,

Toronto, Harvard, and Northwestern, as well as confessional colleges from Calvin to Wheaton, and the International Society for Science and Religion founded at Cambridge, has elected him a Fellow.

A native of Atlanta, Georgia, **Philip Yancey** earned graduate degrees in Communications and English from Wheaton College and the University of Chicago. He joined the staff of *Campus Life* magazine in 1971, and worked there for ten years as Editor and then Publisher.

Then Philip became a full-time writer, initially working as a journalist for such varied publications as *Reader's Digest, National Wildlife, Christian Century,* and *The Reformed Journal*. For many years he wrote a monthly column for *Christianity Today*, which he still serves as Editor at Large.

He has written over twenty-five books, including *Where Is God When It Hurts, Prayer: Does It Make Any Difference?*, and *Disappointment with God*. The books have won thirteen Gold Medallion Awards from the Christian Publishers Association and have sold more than fifteen million copies in English, as well as being translated into forty languages. Among his most recent books are *The Question That Never Goes Away* and *Vanishing Grace: What Ever Happened to the Good News?*

The Yanceys lived in downtown Chicago before moving to a very different environment in Colorado. They enjoy mountain climbing, skiing, wildlife, and all the other delights of the Rocky Mountains.

FRIDAY, July 28, 2017 Denver Front Range Geology Tour



After boarding a motorcoach at 8:30 AM, you will spend an informative full day with geologist Steve Smith from the US Geological Survey. Steve will include stops at Red Rocks Amphitheater and Dinosaur Ridge (with dinosaur bones and tracks). You will have time to enjoy your boxed lunch from CSM at the Ridge Visitors Center and Museum. After lunch you will walk Triceratops Trail (~1 easy mile) and then finish with a stop atop Lookout Mountain where you will have a view of the entire Denver area and also see Buffalo Bill's Grave. During the trip, as you scan the beautiful scenery and rocks, Steve will describe Colorado's geologic history, mining history, dinosaur remains, and modern geological hazards. The bus should return to CSM around 4:00 PM.

Rocky Mountain National Park



The mountains are calling and we must go! At 8:00 AM, hop aboard a bus and travel north to Rocky Mountain National Park. The Park has 400+ square miles of spectacular scenery, more than 100 mountain peaks, and some of the best wildlife viewing anywhere. En route, biologist Angela Kantola will review the history, flora, and fauna of the park, and we'll have time to get to know our

fellow travelers. Within the park, our route will include Trail Ridge Road, one of the highest paved roads in the world, peaking at a magnificent 12,183 feet on the Continental Divide. Although this is a bus tour, we will have opportunities for photography, some strolling about, and, of course, time to enjoy our box lunches. Don't miss the chance to experience this gem of Colorado's Rocky Mountains. The bus will return to CSM at about 5:00 PM.

National Renewable Energy SOLDLaboratory (NREL) TourOUT

NREL is one of 21 national laboratories and technology centers overseen by the US Department of Energy, and is the only federal laboratory dedicated to the research, development, commercialization, and deployment of renewable energy and energy efficiency technologies. This tour will make its way through a few of the buildings on campus, led by scientists and subject matter experts in the areas of energy efficient buildings, 3-D visualization, data mining, solar energy research, and others.

US citizens must show government-issued photo identification (such as a driver's license). Foreign nationals (including Canadian citizens, permanent resident aliens, and resident aliens) must show their passport and visa. All participants are required to wear closed-toe shoes and long pants. Safety glasses will be provided onsite must be worn when directed. NREL is ADA compliant but is designed primarily as a "walking campus." Be sure to note any ambulatory issues on your registration. Cameras are allowed. Cars will depart at 8:30 AM and return around 12:00 PM.

Pre-Meeting Workshop

FRIDAY, July 28, 2017 1:30 PM-5:00 PM

The Energy, Environment, and Ethics Nexus Brent Nelson, Facilitator

Each year the world consumes more energy than the year before. This growing demand for energy presents a variety of environmental and ethical challenges. This workshop presents an overview of the various primary energy sources, both consumable (coal, oil, natural gas, and nuclear) and renewable (wind, geothermal, ocean, bioenergy, hydropower, and solar), discussing the "blessings and curses" of each. We will also touch on how these primary energy sources fan out into secondary energy technologies such as fuel cells, the smart grid, energy efficiency, energy storage, and thermoelectrics, as well as to energy uses such as heating and cooling, transportation, lighting, and industrial processes. Energy extraction, production, and use have profound impacts on economies and jobs, national security, climate change, land and water use, and the environment. The workshop will end with a discussion around the question: "What is the Christian responsibility with regard to energy production and consumption?"



Brent Nelson spent the first part of his career studying second-generation photovoltaic (PV) devices; primarily hydrogenated amorphous silicon and its alloys at National Renewable Energy Laboratory (NREL). He has authored numerous scientific publications, refereed papers for various journals and conferences, and been on the organizing committee for several domestic and international scientific conferences. Currently Brent manages the Engineering and Informatics group for the Materials and Chemicals Science and Technology directorate at NREL. This is a group of engineers and technicians that keep research equipment "experiment ready" and state-of-the-art. Through the years Brent has volunteered with several nonprofit organizations, helping found three, including the Fellowship of Home Churches.

Climate Change Tour Package: National Center for Atmospheric Research and the National Ice Core Laboratory



The National Center for Atmospheric Research (NCAR) is a federally funded research and development center devoted to service, research, and education in the atmospheric and related sciences. This 90-min tour includes a short introduction to their visualization facility, plus time in their visitor center exhibits and on their weather trail. We will leave CSM after lunch at 1:00 PM, with the tour starting at 1:45 PM. After the completed tour at 3:15 PM, we will board the bus and drive to the National Ice Core Laboratory (NICL) in Lakewood.



The National Ice Core Laboratory (NICL) is a facility for storing, curating, and studying meteoric ice cores recovered from the glaciated regions of the world. NICL provides scientists with the capability to conduct examinations and measurements on ice cores, and it preserves the integrity of these ice cores in a long-term repository for future investigations. This is a 30-min tour, with 15-min overview talk, and 10 min or so in the freezer, either in the working area (-10°F, -24°C) or in the main storage area (-36°F, -38°C). The bus will return to CSM about 5:30 PM.

Conference Packages for Campus Lodging and Meals

Conference packages are person. For double occupancy, each individual must purchase a package separately.

The conference package includes lodging for Friday through Sunday nights, a linen package, and nine meals. Linens provided include 1 pillow, 1 pillowcase, 2 flat sheets, 1 blanket, 1 washcloth, 1 hand towel, 1 bath towel and shower soap. Please be advised that no other amenities are provided either in the rooms or bathrooms. Guests must provide their own toiletries, alarm clocks, irons, hangers, reading lights, cups, and extra linens.

The meals begin with Friday dinner through Monday lunch, including the Saturday night banquet. For those who wish to extend their stay, Thursday night lodging includes three meals: Thursday dinner, Friday breakfast, and Friday lunch. Lodging only is available for Monday and Tuesday nights.

We will be staying in **Maple Hall**, a fully air-conditioned, four-story building that has free wireless internet access and an elevator. Each room accommodates up to two guests and every pair of rooms share a connecting bathroom. We have a limited number of rooms reserved for married couples who wish to have a private bathroom.

If you select a double occupancy room and do not have a roommate, we will do our best to match you with a roommate. Each resident will receive a room key and a card for Maple Hall and meals; replacement of lost room key and card is \$150. Lodging check in starts at 3 PM and check out ends at 10 AM daily. If you fail to check out by 10 AM on the day of departure, you will be charged an *additional* night's lodging. Luggage storage is available for those leaving campus later in the day.

Campus Parking and Parking Passes

CSM is a Pay-to-Park <u>campus</u>, MON thru FRI, 7 AM–5 PM, evenings and weekends are free. Visitor parking is authorized in the blue and yellow lots where the "pay and display" parking meters are located. Parking meters appear as orange circles on the campus <u>map</u>. You can park in any unrestricted space, but not a faculty/staff space or red zone (can result in a ticket that's reported to the Colorado DMV). To park in a handicapped space, hang an official sign (from CO or another state) on your front-windshield mirror.

The conference parking rates are based on *days*, not hours. If your car is parked in the lot any time after midnight up until 11:59 PM, you need to purchase parking for that day. For example, if you arrive Friday night and leave any time on Monday, you need to purchase parking for Friday and Monday. Without a parking pass, campus parking is \$8 per vehicle/per day or \$1.50 per vehicle/per hour. Conference parking passes are **\$6 per vehicle/per day**.
