In fact, an ASA member, whom I just saw in San Diego last week, is flying to Boston this weekend for the memorial service because of the investment that Jack made in his life. I have joked with Jack regularly over the years that he is an ASA legend!

He has been a friend and mentor to many, including myself and my colleagues. For the last 20 years, Jack has been one of us as a volunteer staff member. He has spent countless hours in the ASA office, volunteering his time and has regularly participated in the annual staff Christmas parties. In fact, Jack and his wife Ann hosted the 2019 Christmas gathering in their beautiful home, and we had a wonderfully delightful time together. As part of our traditional Yankee swap, Jack pulled the gag gift of the toilet paper and holder, and we got many good laughs out of that. He had a terrific sense of humor and a witty personality.

In addition, Jack and Ann, blessed with the gift of hospitality, have hosted many ASA members in their home over the years and as recently as the 2018 annual meeting at Gordon. The ASA staff has spent many coffee and lunch visits with them in their home enjoying delicious food, stimulating conversation, and warm fellowship.
